OUR JANUARY MEETING

Attendance: 55 present, 17 apologies, 5 non-responses, plus 3 visitors.

<u>President</u>: John Chambers opened the meeting and mentioned the new sound system that had been installed in the church, and the new tables that had only arrived that morning. He welcomed all visitors and visiting Probians and announced the resignation of David and Cheryl Crockett, who have moved away from the area. He acknowledged the passing of John Thomas, who had been a dedicated member until about a year ago, when he resigned due to ill health. John then wished "Happy Birthday" to those members who have birthdays in January.

<u>Vice President</u>: Carol Spencer wished everyone Happy New Year and invited members to lunch at Canadian Bay Hotel after the meeting.

<u>Secretary</u>: Catherine Johnson requested that the minutes of the previous meeting be moved and seconded, and then discussed various correspondences. She also advised that the nomination forms for the 2017-2018 Management Committee were available, and that they should be completed and handed in by the next General Meeting in March.

<u>Treasurer</u>: Lindsay Gordon advised that all commitments are up to date and that the balance of funds is healthy.

<u>Tours and Outings</u>: Estelle Gold spoke of the two events at Frankston Arts Centre in February and March, and of the Changeover Lunch on 22nd March 2017 at Norwood House at \$49 per head.

<u>Speakers</u>: Neil Gold advised that the speakers today were to be **Deb Fleiner** and **Estelle Gold.**

<u>Welfare</u>: Maxine Coughlan announced that **Jack Andrews** is now in a nursing facility, and then wished all a "Happy New Year".

<u>Dine Outs</u>: Bette Wilson announced that the next dine out is at Kirk's on Friday 20th January at 12.30pm.



Investment Club: Max Batchelor announced that 2016 finished quite well being up by 7% which is not a bad return. 5% happened in December! With only having four days trade so far this year, the stock market is already up by 1.5%. Things are a bit unsettled with Donald Trump on the horizon, and unfortunately we are held hostage by what happens in the US. This year the group is down by three members with a total of nineteen portfolios. There is room for new investors. John Roberts is the overall winner of the 2016 Tipping Competition, being very close to the end result, and Andy Troy (now an official member) is already up 4.6% for this year. A promising start!



<u>Book Club</u>: Wendy Griffiths said that there are eleven members in the group which has its first meeting for 2017 on Monday 6th February at the home of Wendy and Stephen Griffiths. The first book for the year is "The Grapes of Wrath" by John Steinbeck.



<u>Speakers</u>: Deb Fleiner read a poem called "The Battle of Hastings" by Marriott Edgar, who was most noted for the monologues he wrote for the comic actor Stanley Holloway, and for the series of poems about "Albert".

Our main speaker today was **Estelle Gold**, who as a cardiac nurse in Cape Town South Africa, was part of the team that assisted **Dr Christiaan Barnard** in the first heart transplants fifty years ago. She explained that Dr Barnard had been appointed cardiothoracic surgeon at the Groote Schuur Hospital, establishing the hospital's first heart unit.

Pig valves had been used to replace faulty valves in humans, but complications arose during recovery. By the early 1960's, the thinking came around to heart transplants. Dr Barnard experimented by performing heart transplants on feral dogs, but none survived more than ten days. He learned how to do the intricate connection of arteries and veins by going to the US and studying kidney transplants, and he also went to France where studies were being done on tissue transplants. The need for immunosuppressant therapy soon became apparent.



Then legality and ethical issues arose. Obviously a heart transplant requires a donor to be deceased, brain dead but with otherwise healthy organs. When is a person actually dead? People can be kept alive on a machine to keep the heart pumping indefinitely, so controversy arose about the exact moment of death. Emotion also came to play, as many people believe that the heart is a person's being, when in actual fact it is merely a pump made from muscle. However it was agreed that there would not be a transplant between different cultures, or between different ethnic groups.

The first transplant took place on December 3rd 1967. The donor was a road accident victim whose father had donated her body and was on a respirator, and the recipient - **Louis Washkansky**, a fifty four year old grocer with diabetes and incurable heart disease. Both donor and recipient were fastidiously prepared as infection was greatly feared. The transplant took hours as Dr Barnard with arthritic fingers, painstakingly stitched very tiny sutures to join the blood vessels and arteries together. The heart started working again after a defibrillator was used.

In those days, the heart unit had only one monitor for twenty patients. Louis Washkansky was in an oxygen tent and was monitored every five minutes around the clock, being watched for rejection. Initially the patient did very well, but by day 12 he got pneumonia, and then on day 18 he died.

Somehow the news of the transplant was leaked to the press, and even though South Africa did not have television in those days, the news quickly travelled around the world. People from all over the place began to arrive for a transplant, and Dr Barnard found it very difficult to send them back.

Philip Blaiberg was the second heart transplant recipient, and he survived nineteen months, and the third was **Dorothy Fisher**, who lived for fourteen years.

Estelle said that Dr Barnard was a charismatic man who was very passionate about his work, and really cared for his patients. A boy from Northern Italy, with a hole in his heart, was sent to Dr Barnard who operated on him. The boy survived but could not eat the food he was given and therefore was not thriving. Estelle went to a local Italian restaurant and got some Italian food for him, which he wolfed down. Dr Barnard then paid for the boy's food for two months whilst he recovered. That boy, now an adult, lives in Rome, and Estelle and Neil have visited him on several occasions.

Now transplants of all descriptions are commonplace, but even after fifty years there is still some resistance in organ donation. Estelle said she felt proud to be part of such exciting pioneering research.

She was thanked by **Neil Gold** for giving a most interesting and informative talk.
