
We will be sitting at round tables of 8 and there will be a glass of Rahona Valley wine and a Grazing Platter.

Report of our Men's Coffee Club's occasion – Bob Brunton

Saturday, 19th July at 1001 Nights.



Well, this month's Men's Coffee Group Meeting, or more specifically it's prelude, was certainly an action-packed, and up-lifting, one for me.
